Even on the Battlefield, God is in Control

Ray Grefsrud was twenty-two years old when he left the family farm and enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1942. Homesick for his parents and twelve siblings, he wrote often from the European battlefields where he was serving as an infantryman during World War 2. In his letters, he mentioned continuous fighting for seven days and other grueling experiences.


Then a letter dated November 21, 1944 arrived from "somewhere in France." It began, "Dear folks. Well, I'm now at a hospital again." He went on to explain that he had been shot several times.

His next letter revealed more details. "I sure thank God that I wasn't hurt more," Grefsrud wrote. "One bullet went through my helmet and steel liner, a half inch lower down and I would not be here today. One bullet went through my shirt pocket, cut my pen and pencil in two and just about cut my New Testament in two." God's Word had saved his life!

When he returned to northern Minnesota to farm and raise a family after the war, he brought the contents of his pocket with him and packed them away in a small box in a drawer, but never mentioned them. Family members say he was very humble, and though he never talked about any of his war experiences, he often said, "God's in control."


"He had a huge faith," his daughter said. After her father passed away at the age of 93 and family members found his letters and war-time memorabilia, she said, "With the testament [protecting] his heart, it was like God's in control. He said that all the time. 'God's in control." It was a truth Ray Grefsrud knew well.
